Socio-Economic Standing & International Students

- Schooling Cost
 - tuition, room/board, books
 - no federal aid
- Cost of Living
 - employment
 - on-campus
 - no work-study
- After Graduation
 - cost of immigration
- Current Perceptions around class
 - "cash cows"

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Shifting the Focus: Internal Linkages & Collaboration



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Prep, Ongoing Support, & Collaboration

Preparation

- Providing holistic advising
- Intentionally explore social identities
 - Implement trainings for staff members
- Integrate development models/theories into advising and programming

Ongoing Support

- Hold peer-led discussion groups
- Avoid heteronormative perspectives in departmental material
- Encourage deeper immersion into local community
- Explore the ways in which their experience can lead to academic opportunities

Collaboration

- Partner with University's LGBTQ Center, Women's Center, Multicultural Center, Health Center
- Find mentors in colleagues and peers for students

Theoretical Frameworks



CRITICAL RACE THEORY

- Offers a radical lens to deconstruct and challenge structural racial neutrality
- Examines issues around race, racial identity and racism
- Storytelling
 - explores hegemonic narratives of power and privilege
 - explores counter narratives from marginalized racial identities
- Notion of intersectionality
 - recognizes that there is not one simplistic, unitary identity
 - $_{\circ}\,$ coined by Kimberle Crenshaw



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Theoretical Frameworks

QUEER THEORY

- Stems most visibly from subcultural and political activism
 - i.e. civil rights movement, gay liberation
- What is that historical development?
 - modernism
 - structuralism
 - post-structuralism & postmodernism

- Traces the historical development of social concepts that are responsible for shaping the definitions of "<u>sex</u>" and "<u>gender.</u>"
 - expression//identity vs biological sex
 - cisgender
 - $_{\circ}$ transgender
- Identity politics, non-conformity, and influence of dominant heteronormative binary



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Orientation: Introducting LGBTQ Identity

 - international student orientation
 - over 70% of all SU transfer students are international students
 - Indonesia, China, and Vietnam
