

Presentation Vocabulary

Ethnocentrism: Overtly or subtly judging another culture based on 1) the standards and values of one's own culture and 2) the belief that one's own nation or ethnic group is intrinsically superior.

Intersectionality: Coined by Kimberle Crenshaw, a framework designed to highlight the existence of intersecting marginalization and/or privilege based on social categorizations and identity markers within a context of connected systems and structures of power.

Neoracism: A form of discrimination or prejudice based on nationality, culture or ethnicity; neoracism justifies discrimination on the basis of 'cultural differences' or national origin rather than by physical characteristics related to a specific race.

Othering: to place a person or group into the position of being an "other"; recognizing them as different or even inferior.
