### LGBTQI+ students: Data and Trends



- An estimated **4.5%** of the U.S. population identifies as LGBT
  - 30 % are between the ages of 18-24

#### (The Williams Institute, UCLA School of Law)

- **55.8%** of LGBTQ students reported no discussion or inclusion of LGBTQ topics in sex education curriculum in school.
  - 22.4% reported having no sex education in school at all

#### (<u>GLSEN, 2017</u>)

- Lesbian, gay, and bisexual youth are at greater risk for depression, suicide, and substance abuse (<u>CDC</u>)
- Currently, no comprehensive data on LGBTQI+ identified study abroad students from IIE Open Doors Report

### Intersectionality

- LGBTQI+ students have other identities that will come into play and affect their experiences abroad
- LGBTQI+ identity may not always be the top concern/priority
- Different social identities as lenses that interact




### **Cultural Considerations**



- Be mindful of overgeneralizing a culture and its approach to gender roles, identity, and sexual orientation
- Prior research is essential. Consider:
- News and history
- Politics and laws (and pending legislation)
  - Erasing 76 Crimes
- Religion
- Celebrations and clandestine communities

### **Sexual Health Abroad**

[Sexual health] is a state of physical, emotional, mental and social well-being in relation to sexuality; it is not merely the absence of disease, dysfunction or infirmity. Sexual health requires a positive and respectful approach to sexuality and sexual relationships, as well as the possibility of having pleasurable and safe sexual experiences, free of coercion, discrimination and violence. For sexual health to be attained and maintained, the sexual rights of all persons must be respected, protected and fulfilled. World Health Organization



### Being Out (or not) at home and abroad


- For many students, studying abroad presents an opportunity for self-reflection and identity exploration.
- Much like other aspects of identity development, students' comfort and level of salience with their LGBTQI+ identity is dynamic; not all students will be at the same point in their journeys.
- Students' decisions or abilities to be "out" (or not) at home or abroad should be respected.

#### I Am LGBTQ. Is My Relationship Healthy?

Healthy relationships all look different. What they have in common is being based on equality and respect. What they don't have in common is how they're structured or who's in them. In fact, healthy LGBTQ relationships are often characterized by how resilient, creative and unique they are. It can be hostile out there — why shouldn't your relationship be a safe space where you're free to be yourself? Some signs of a healthy relationship include a partner who:

- Respects your chosen gender pronouns or name.
- Respects your boundaries.
- Gives you space to hang out with friends and family without thinking you're cheating.
- Doesn't take your money or tell you what to buy.
- Never threatens to out you to people. .. (From Love is Respect)

### **Understanding Sexual Violence for the LBGTQI+ Community**

- **73% of LGBTQ college students** experience sexual harassment or abuse (American Association of University Women)
- **44% of lesbians and 61% of bisexual women** experience rape, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner (Centers for Disease Control National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey)
- **26% of gay men and 37% of bisexual men** experience rape, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner (Centers for Disease Control National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey)
- 20% 25% of college women and 15% of college men are victims of forced sex during their time in college (US Department of Justice/National Sexual Violence Resource Center)
- 47% of transgender people are sexually assaulted at some point in their lifetime. In communities of color, these numbers are higher: American Indian (65%), multiracial (59%), Middle Eastern (58%), and Black (53%) respondents of the 2015 U.S. Transgender Survey were most likely to have been sexually assaulted in their lifetime. (National Center for Transgender Equality)

### Supporting transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming (GNC) students

- <u>Trans 101: The Basics</u> "A guide to people who are trans and gender diverse ....."
- Language matters
  - $\circ$  misgendering
  - $\circ$  deadnames
  - language beyond the binary
- Let the student lead the way
  - Good advice for working with any LGBTQI+ identified students
  - Each situation will be unique based on their choices
  - Most important to connect the students with resources and approach support with a priority on safety and health, but making sure not to single out the student



### **Your Role**

- None of us can have all of the answers all of the time
- Be an advocate, and identify campus/community advocates. Make referrals!
- Whether LGBTQI+ or ally, you are a part of an LGBTQI+ student's support network as they study abroad
- One supportive person can have a profound impact on a student's life (<u>Trevor Project, 2019</u>)



### **Best Practices for Advisors & Guiding Questions**

- Remember the role that intersectionality plays and follow the student's lead; don't make assumptions unless a student discloses information about how they identify; use inclusive language
- If a student discloses that they identify as LGBTQI+, you might offer them these reflective questions to guide your discussions:
  - To what degree will I openly express my sexual orientation and gender identity while studying abroad? What does it mean to be LGBTQI+ in my host country?
  - Do I want/need a study abroad location and community that supports my identity?
  - For students who identify as transgender or gender nonconforming (GNC), is my host country trans-inclusive? What is the status of transgender individuals in the host country?



### **Best Practices for Orientations**

#### **Pre-Departure Orientations**

- Introduce yourself and your staff with personal pronouns
- Invite a member of a local LGBTQI+ support/advocacy group to speak with all pre-departure students
- Include topics of safer sex, sexual violence, and bystander intervention training
- Connect students with study abroad alumni from the LBGTQI+ community who have personal experiences living and traveling abroad
- Provide resources to help students research and identify in-country support networks

#### **On-site Orientations**

- Include sexual health and LGBTQI+ topics for all students
- Identify areas where LGBTQI+ students will be safe and welcomed in the local area or provide opportunities for students to connect with locals who can help them navigate more clandestine communities



Above all, do what you can to create a safe space for students to reflect and seek support when needed. Understand that LGBTQI+ students may face additional challenges as they adjust to life in the host culture. Your encouragement and support could make all the difference in the trajectory of their experiences.
