

Understanding U.S Context


Ensure our on-site partners and faculty understand

- Case study: racial tensions arise during classroom debate on race during a faculty-led program in London.




Supporting Black Students: Abroad



- On-Site Orientation
- Co-Creating Inclusive Community with Students

- Hiring for diversity locally
- Training local staff
- Diverse local collaborations

Supporting Black Students: Abroad



- Evaluate and work with university partners and providers on diversity, inclusion, and support services
- Provide students with resources before departure that are accessible abroad
- Provide faculty training on fostering equity,
 - inclusion, and belonging
- Create virtual space for black students studying
 - abroad to connect and share experiences

Supporting Black Students: Reentry



- Collaborate with campus partners to create community for returning students: "meet-up" events
- Conduct returnee debriefs to address any concerns during their time abroad
- Revamp re-entry event to include reflection on identity
- Make reentry resources accessible to students before they return: My Global Identity Race & Ethnicity Abroad modules
- Peer Advisor and Global Ambassador Programs
