

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

Impact of COVID-19 Pandemic

- Many countries in Asia had strong COVID-19 restrictions
 - Entry restrictions
 - Restrictions on day-to-day activities
- Inequality in vaccine access/distribution
- China zero COVID policy, travel restrictions
- Continued elevated
 Department of State travel
 advisory for mainland China





COVID-19 Pandemic Impacts

- •COVID-19 ushered in uncertain "socioeconomic futures, political upheavals, increased societal tensions and a rise in global protest movements," (Sagramoso, 2020).
- Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) issued a directive that declared how international students could not legally stay in the United States if they were taking all their classes online (ACE, July 20, 2020).
- •"China has caused great damage to the United States and the rest of the World!" (Trump, 2020). (July 20, 2020)

Asiatic Plague that Threatens the Ruins of California

"We've already over 100,000 Chinese in a total population of less than a million and the cry is, 'still they come.' The City of Peking, which arrived here some twelve days ago brought 1,017 more of this undesirable and ruinous class." (San Francisco Chronicle, 1876)



Discriminatory rhetoric:
"yellow wave," the
"yellow plague," and the
"Mongol invasion."

Currently: COVID-19 pandemic has displayed perpetual prejudicial anti-Asian rhetoric Extraterritoriality Laws in China, demonstrates how Western nations like the United States, France, and Great Britain believed they were superior to the Chinese.

(Ku, 1994)

Anti-Asian rhetoric and belief is a perpetual issue that has developed historically and transnationally. (Lee, 2005; Rhee & Sagaria, 2004).

1908 Continuous Journey Law, barred individuals from entering if you didn't come from a "continuous journey," which hindered South Asians from entering the United States.

(Lee, 2005)

Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 targeted Chinese laborers from migrating to the United States (Lee, 2005)

1907 U.S. Immigration Regulation barred Japanese and Koreans from immigrating through Hawaii.

Advising

- Dispel misconceptions about Asia during advising
- Consider events that promote Asia programs/culture
- Think strategically about family members
 - Asking about family support
 - Accepted students webinar can include parents
 - Parent chat sessions
- Have concrete information/next steps for questions about:
 - Mental health access
 - Disability access & services
 - LGBTQI+ support





Financial

 Promote national scholarships with a focus on study outside Europe



 Dedicate institutional funds to programs in Asia









Program Management

 Think creatively about program design to address concerns about studying in Asia







• Encourage departmental support of study abroad in Asia. Partner with language departments, etc.
