What points of history have influenced Race in Spain today?

- In the 8th century, and lived there for almost 800 years the North Africans (Berber Muslims) made a mark on Spanish culture, including influencing everything from <u>Music</u> to Mathematics. Over 4,000 Arabic words and Arabic-derived phrases have been absorbed into the Spanish language.
- By 1614, all Berber Muslims were expelled from Spain; Islam and Judaism were entirely eradicated from the Iberian Peninsula. The population of Muslims in Spain decreased from 500,000 to 0 within 100 years.
- July 18, 1936, Franco started an uprising the northwest of Spain with the support of Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy. Franco also outlawed unions and all religions except for Catholicism, as well as banning the Catalan and Basque languages.
- Until the early 1970s, Spain lived in isolation. There was little to no immigration. Cultural diversity even for Spaniards was banned - including bullfighting and Flamenco dancing.
- Rita Bosaho, Spain elected the first black member to Parliament, Rita Bosaho, December 2015.









Snapshot of some of the Communities of Color in Spain today

THE INDO-PAKISTANI COMMUNITY

In 1972, the first Pakistani immigrants arrived in Catalunya, coming mainly from the Punjab region. Today there are over 17,000 immigrants from India and Pakistan living in Barcelona. (Source: https://www.barcelona-metropolitan.com/features/report-barcelona-pakistani-community/

THE CHINESE COMMUNITY

From 2017, the Chinese community is the second largest community. The vast majority of Chinese residents started arriving in Spain around the 1980's. Today there are more than 66,000 Chinese residents living in Spain, many residing in Madrid and Barcelona (Source: Gómez, Luis, "<u>El poder chino en España</u>."

THE AFRO-SPANIARD COMMUNITY

It wasn't until the 1970's that that we had the first wave of black immigrants coming from diverse countries such as Gambia, Senegal and Sierra Leona. There are currently 1,301,296 people residents in Spain who were born in countries of the African continent, excluding the 1,802,810 born in Ceuta, Melilla and the Canary Islands which are Spanish territories geographically located in Africa. source: https://www.ine.es)

THE MOROCCAN COMMUNITY

Small groups of Moroccan immigration to Catalonia began in 1967, and increased in 1972 after the consulate of the Kingdom of Morocco was established in Barcelona. Today there are more than 900,00 Moroccans living in Spain. (Source: https://www.ine.es)

LATIN AMERICAN COMMUNITIES

Latin Americans are one of the largest community of color in Spain. According to data from, INE (Instituto Nacional de Estadística) noted that Colombia (500,000+) and Argentina (300,000+), Bolivia (100,000+) having the largest populations. Source: (<u>https://www.ine.es</u>)

Racial and Ethnic Climate in Spain an Overview

- Spain (like most EU countries) does not collect ethnicity data; the only official data points are national origin and citizenship
- Until the end of the millenium Spain was a country of migration; immigration is a relatively new phenomenon
- Foreign-born populations tend to be differentiated between "migrants/refugees" and "expats"
- Recent surveys indicate high levels of ambivalence towards migration with both favorable and unfavorable attitudes reported
- There are some negative associations of immigrants with organized crime, delinquency, and prostitution
- The far right political party Vox expresses anti non European immigrant sentiments

- <u>The Afropean</u> journal, exploring the social, cultural and aesthetic interplay of black and European cultures, and the synergy of styles and ideas brought about because of this union.
- <u>Africanidad</u> is an online newspaper for Spanish-speaking people of African descent in Spain.
- Las Morenas de España is an online platform and blog where women of color share their experience abroad and learn from others. While it is mostly aimed towards expats working in Spain, the blog also has pieces that are aimed at anyone living abroad.
- Intersect Madrid is a grassroots organization that creates and fosters communities of educators dedicated to promoting anti-racism and addressing intersectional forms of oppression.
- <u>Black Barcelona</u> is Barcelona's main meeting point for Black folx in Barcelona. They organize an annual festival run and led by a large team of volunteers.

- <u>Afroféminas</u> is an online community for Spanish-speaking women of African descent
- <u>Asociación de Estudiantes Latinoamericanxs:</u> "Somos estudiantes universitarias/os latinoamericanas/os de la Universidad Complutense de Madrid con primordial interés por América Latina y sus relaciones con España."
- <u>Conciencia Afro:</u> The Conciencia Afro team is made up of African and Afro-descendant people based in Madrid. They work on a variety of projects and host discussion groups and an annual festival.
- <u>STAMPED</u> podcast, highlighting study abroad stories of Black/African American students and industry professionals.
