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

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

Do we adopt an asset framing that honors and draws on the histories and lived experiences of our students, faculty, and staff? Are we privileging some voices and marginalizing others?

Which voices, experiences, and perspectives are missing? Which are normalized and elevated?

Are we replicating dynamics of colonialism and colonization either implicitly or explicitly?
