Each cycle, IIE will select 40 U.S. colleges and universities in the IIENetwork as <u>American</u> <u>Passport Project</u> grant recipients so they can help 25 first-year students who are eligible for Pell grants obtain a U.S. passport. The Power of International Education

Developing Arkansas Global Opportunity: Identifying Needs

- National Survey of Student Engagement results
- Examine Study Abroad application withdrawal data from 2018-19
 - reason for withdrawal
 - passport acknowledgement
 - demographic data
- Keeping in mind the <u>four Fs</u> named by Dr. Johnetta Betsch Cole: finances, faculty, family, and fear



For the 2016 NSSE, 4,710 first-year UARK students were invited to participate (39% responded). 54% of respondents indicated that they were interested in or planned to participate in study abroad. Yet only 17.9% of that graduating class (the class of 2019) graduated with a study abroad experience.
