# India: A Diversity of People, Language & Culture




- 22 languages recognized by the constitution
- 122 major languages
- More than 2000 dialects<sup>†</sup>
- Dialect changes every 100 km<sup>+</sup>
- Diversity of opinions, backgrounds, literacy levels, cultures, accomplishments, aspirations
- 1.3 billion people seeking opportunities to improve their own social standing





# India's Population Compared to Other Countries



- High population levels
- Aspirations are limited by access to opportunities
- Overseas opportunities are sought after
- Indians are largest group of test takers for standardized tests such as GRE, TOEFL, and GMAT
  - ~100K GRE test takers in 2015-16<sup>+</sup>
  - ~29K GMAT test takers in 2015\*



Indian Higher Education Enrollments in Top 7 Receiving Countries, 2005 - 2012










# The Indian Education System

- Predominantly lecture-based
- Theory-heavy coursework, prescribed text books, and model "examination papers"
- Large class size
- High student-teacher ratio
- Preset coursework for each semester
- Cohort-based grouping







# Understanding Factors Affecting Indian Students' Participation In Academia

- Decisions are rarely individual-driven parents/elders/family/friends are involved
- Intense competition
  - 1.3 million students took the IIT JEE in 2016<sup>†</sup>
- Too much focus on academics at the expense of extracurricular activities
- Students more prone to silence rather than ask questions of the professor
- Wary of offending others rarely voice disagreement
- Hardworking get things done

# Sensitivity to Indian Students is a Diversity Imperative

- How Can We Empathize With Newly Arrived Indian Students to Our Campuses?
  - Create opportunities in the classroom
    - engaging interactions that draw on prior experiences of the students
  - Help them identify potential pitfalls
    - adjusting to a new culture while handling multiple responsibilities







# Creating Safety Nets for Indian Students to Cope in Their New Homes in the US

- Support from the graduate school to ease transition will be highly effective
  - Leverage Indian faculty/staff/community members to serve as mentors to Indian students during transition period
  - Connecting incoming students with the Indian Students' Association
  - Creating a buddy system that pairs current students with incoming students







# Creating Safety Nets for Indian Students to Cope in Their New Homes in the US

## Top 5 Academic Support Areas:

- Allow students time to familiarize with software packages used in labs
- Proactively share expectations of proficiency in various topics
  - Ensures they can come up to speed while still in India
- Encourage involvement in student clubs
  - Immerse in learning beyond classroom
- Highlight importance of class participation and participating in open discussion
- Open door office policy and timely check-ins to address any concerns










# Creating Safety Nets for Indian Students to Cope in Their New Homes in the US

## Top 7 Social/Cultural Support Areas:

- Social icebreaker before launching into coursework
- Empathize with students facing culture shock
- Making the effort to pronounce students' names correctly
- Teachers referred to as "Sir" or "Ma'am" and not by first names
- Appreciating different communication styles
  - question vs. doubt
- Leverage Indian Students Association to ensure no one falls through the cracks
- Pairing with buddies to ease transition and answer questions

# Before The Indian Students Arrive On Campus

## Preparing For Arrival – Top 5 Things:

- Use social media Facebook/Twitter/LinkedIn to join student groups
- Connect with potential roommates, plan housing, etc.
- Reach out to International Students Office
- Plan involvement with student clubs and other activities
- Understand pre-requisites for courses and ensure familiarity with topics







# Once They Arrive On Campus

## Top 7 Things To Do On Campus:

- Create a plan of study that reflects their aspirations
- Leverage office hours to understand subject matter better
- Developing team skills it's the key to success in courses and projects
- Emphasis on learning concepts tests/assignments are challenging
- Approach Vs. accuracy
- Class participation counts!
- Strict rules against plagiarism


