Beyond the Binary



What this study is, and what it isn't

- Primary focus was on male students, not sexuality or gender identity
- Gay men were part of the study, but sexuality was not a research question for my specific research
- Unknown if gender fluid men were part of this study

At it's heart, this is a study of cis-gendered males who identify as men.



Why should we care?

- Logistical planning
- Increased number of US students going = tap new populations
- Pedagogically diverse voices within our programs
- Benefits to male students
- Benefits to social-institutions







Where the Boy's Aren't: Male Academic Engagement

- Men less likely to go to and graduate from College
- Men less likely to do homework, show interest in class, show interest in graduate school
- Men more likely to engage in negative behavior and be in the judicial system
- Men more likely to spend time relaxing, socializing, and exercising
- Men are less likely to have leadership, service, and cultural experiences ((amper be eighted eighte






The Nature of Boys

Gender Role Conflict

- Men live in a world of increasing social-equity and respect for diversity
- Changing social norms for women are evident, yet not as much for men
- Man "stop-out" positions for men have deteriorated
- Men are both still subjected to social messages about being traditionally "male" and expected to adapt to new social

Summary

- Male students falling behind females in many pro-academic behaviors
- Many theories about why, some related to politics, other related to pollution and brain development
- Some people believe that white men are just readjusting to not being the dominant sex and race in society
- Regardless of the exact cause, data suggests that male students lack direction, role-models, and a sense of what it means to be a man in today's society
