- Identifying areas of mutual interest related to student engagement
- Partnering to avoid competition for students, space, and resources

- Reflective, sit-down dinner for study abroad returnees at the beginning of each semester
- Co-sponsored by the Dean of Students
- Inviting faculty and staff from across campus to serve as “table hosts” to spark student reflection and storytelling

- Global Education Office (GEO) and Black Cultural Center (BCC) partnership
- Annual staff planning meeting about student needs
- Returnee focus group and office hours at the BCC
- GEO peer advisors and BCC Ambassa'dores “meet and greet”



# Arizona State University

Tempe, AZ

- ASU Diaspora Dialogues
- Organized panel moderated by a staff member from a partner office or DEI professional
- Student participants are university alumni or currently enrolled returned students



# Advocating for education abroad

- Alumni student panels
- Ambassador programs
- Returnee conferences
